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## Thursday – 5 June      Early Bird Events

**You must pre-register to participate in the tours!** Each tour will be limited to ten vehicles and twenty five people on a first come first serve basis.

**Convention registration will begin a half hour before the tours at their designated place of departure.**

### Range Creek

**Meet at CEU Museum north parking lot (100 N between 100 E and 200 E); tour will leave at 8.30 am sharp. 4X4 vehicle; minimal walking. This is your chance to see what the canyon is really like behind the locked gate! (This tour will also be available on Friday- 6 June). Participants will be responsible for bringing their own lunch and water. Please be prepared to spend approximately eight hours on this tour traveling in a remote location. Make sure you have a full tank of gas and a good spare tire. Don't forget your camera, binoculars, sun screen and bug spray!**

### Historical Tour by Western Mining & Railroad Museum and Destination Diversions, Helper

**Tour will meet in the Mining Equipment Display parking lot (100 W and Poplar St) behind the Helper Museum and leave at 1.00 pm sharp and will conclude at approximately 4.30 pm. Passenger vehicle okay; minimal walking. Tour will include 1924 Castle Gate mine entrance, cemetery, and former town site, Royal Coal Camp, Historical Helper Main Street and Museum.**

The Western Mining & Railroad Museum will be celebrating National Heritage Week. Join them this evening for the **2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Bordello Ball** at the Civic Auditorium located on Helper's historic Main Street. The Ball is the annual fund raising event for the Museum but don't let the name fool you. No ballroom dancing is required! The event features a dinner, lecture and auction. This year's featured speaker is Joel Frandsen, a lawman and outlaw historian. Joel will be spinning yarns about local outlaws Butch Cassidy and Matt Warner. Come join the fun, food and storytelling all for a good cause. **The event will begin at 7.00 pm. The Museum has extended a special invitation to USAS members and is offering tickets at a special price of \$22 per person or \$40 per couple. **Friday – 6 June**

**Tours & Dinner at Pioneer Park**

**You must pre-register to participate in all of the tours!** Each tour will be limited to ten vehicles and twenty five people on a first come first serve basis. Participants will be responsible for bringing their own lunch and water. Please be prepared to spend approximately eight hours on each tour traveling in remote locations. Most of the sites will take an hour to two hours to reach. Make sure you have a full tank of gas and a good spare tire. Don't forget your camera, binoculars, sun screen and bug spray!

**All tours will meet at the CEU Prehistoric Museum north parking lot (100 N between 100 E and 200 E). Tours will leave at 8.30 am sharp and return approximately by 5.30 pm. Convention registration will begin at 8.00 am in the museum lobby.**

**Range Creek – Mark Connolly and Alan Green (DWR)**

4X4 vehicle; minimal walking. This is your chance to see what the canyon is really like behind the locked gate! See rock art, granaries and historic ranches along with the beautiful scenery.

**Nine Mile Canyon**

High clearance vehicle suggested. For safety issues you need to be aware of sharing the road with many heavy industrial vehicles as this is the corridor they use to reach the gas fields above the canyon.

Because of all the traffic the canyon can be very dusty so people with asthma/allergies be forewarned.

**Roadside Tour - Fred & Diane Gorman Jenkins**

Minimal walking. This tour will stop at sites along the road that are easy to access.

**Warrior Ridge – Chanel Atwood & Renee Barlow**

Steep hike; should be in good shape; creek crossing (water shoes if you don't want to get wet). This site is accessed through private property and not accessible to the general public. It contains some very unique rock art that gave the site its name.

**San Rafael Swell**

**Molen Seep, Rochester Creek, Dry Wash – Marvin Evans**

High clearance vehicle; ½ mile hike each to first two sites with some scrambling. Molen Seep has beautiful Barrier Canyon style rock art and Rochester has an amazing petroglyph panel!

**Buckhorn Draw, Base of Cedar Mountain, Head of Sinbad, Dry Wash - Blaine Miller**

High clearance vehicle; minimal walking. If you ever knew Doc Dorman (who was famous for his rock art jeep safaris) this was his favorite rock art tour!

**Historic Railroad Grade and Camp, MK Tunnels – John Senulis**

High clearance vehicle; some hiking. Visit the remnants of a railroad grade that was constructed in the 1880's but never used and the site of one of its labor camps. The MK tunnels were a test site commissioned by the government in the late 1940's that were intended to store munitions. The tunnels didn't pass the test but are still there as a witness to the Cold War.

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**6.30 pm**

**Dinner at Pioneer Park (100 E between 500 N and 600 N)**

**Dinner is free but you must pre-register!**

Hamburgers, hot dogs, salads, chips, homemade root beer and dessert.

Atlatl throw, socializing, stories from the day's tours and games. Come join the fun!

**Saturday – 7 June**

**Workshops, Presentations, USAS Meeting, Event Dinner and

The basket theme will be revisited again at the evening lecture.

USAS 2008 CONVENTION  
Larry Dalrymple-Keynote Speaker

Larry taught history in secondary schools in both Utah and California for twenty-five years. Because he is a true educator, his communication skills are extraordinary. His interest in Native American arts and crafts began early on and started collecting baskets in 1978. He and family members spent much of their free time pursuing his passion. Larry's desire for basketry knowledge took him into Oregon, California, Nevada, Arizona, Utah, Colorado and New Mexico.

In his twenty plus years of research, Larry traveled thousands of miles on both paved and dirt roads, looking at hundreds of baskets and interviewing weavers. First and foremost he learned the art of relating to weavers, worked with them, gained their trust, and sought their thoughts of today and the past. Using the hands on approach, Larry learned, how, when and where they gathered materials and how they prepared them and when they could weave their baskets. His real understanding of basketry came from the weavers themselves. Over time many of the weavers would ask him questions of what he had seen in his travels.

He moved from California, to Aztec, New Mexico to be closer to weavers in the Four Corners area, later on he moved to Sante Fe to finish his two volume book, entitled "Indian Basketmakers." While completing his book, he worked as an Educational Consultant for the Wheelwright Museum, educating volunteer docents in the art of conducting museum tours. There, he also organized and guided tours though out the west, along with designing displays for the Wheelwright.

Recently he resigned his position of Education Director at the Museum of International Folk Art in Sante Fe to have time to write articles for various magazines. He continues to work with the Institute of American Research and the Wheelwright Museum. Judges major basket shows, such as Sante Fe's Indian Market and the Heard Museum Basket Show. Also, works closely with the School of Advanced Research in Santa Fe. His most recent endeavor was interviewing a long time friend, Stewart Hatch, owner of the Hatch Trading Post near Farmington, New Mexico.

Note: There will be a display of baskets on hand from CEU, Edge of the Cedars, and Larry's collection. Also, he will have his book for sale.

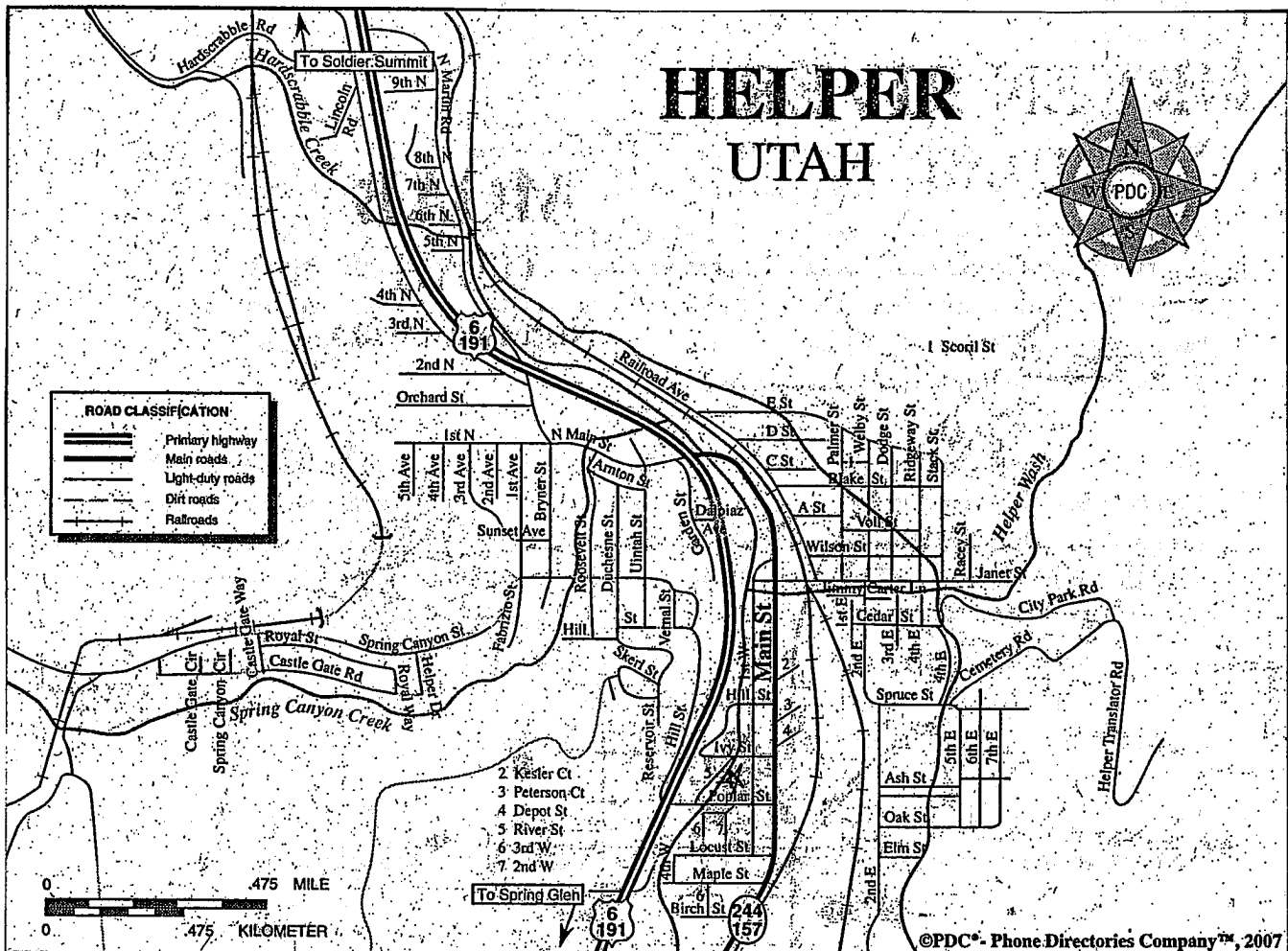

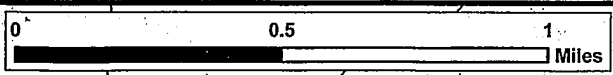

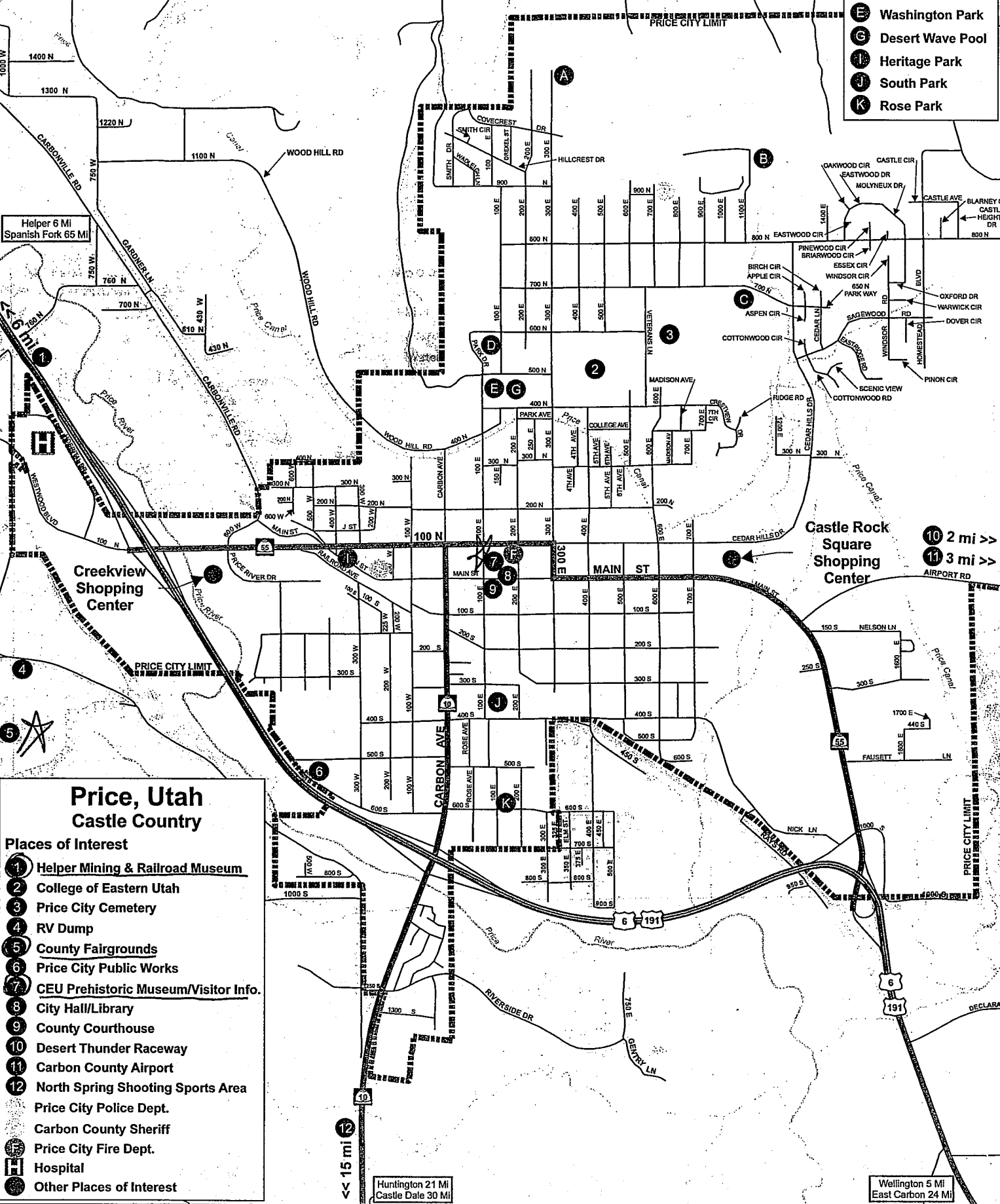
